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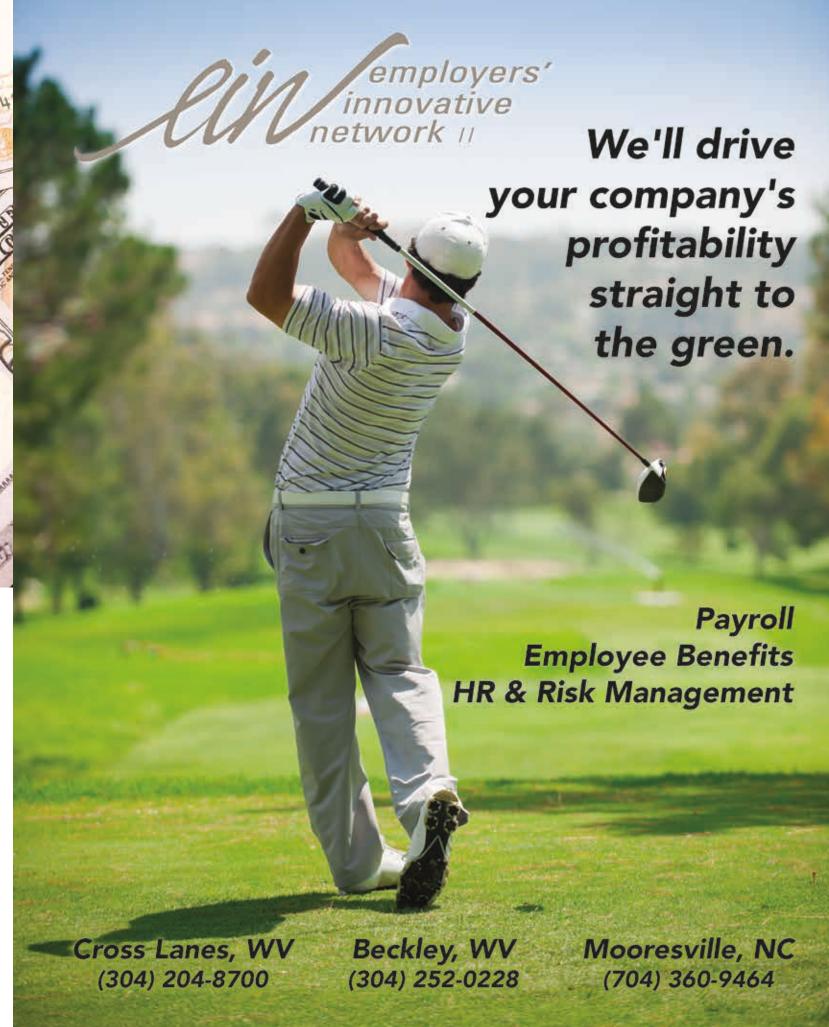
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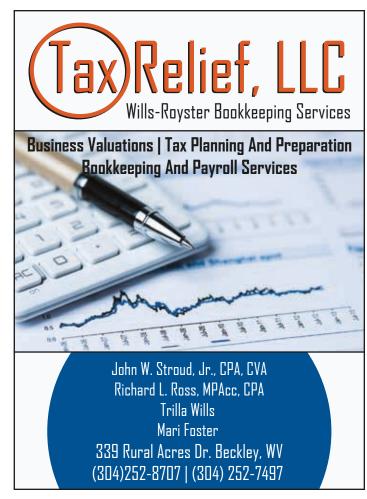
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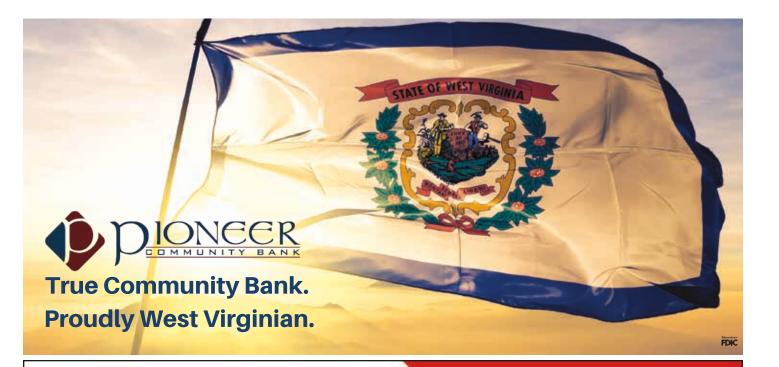
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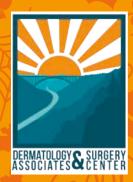


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# OCTOBER is Here!

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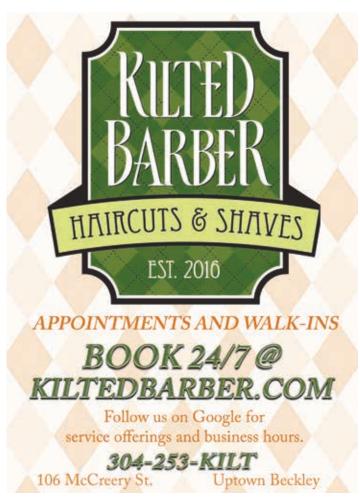
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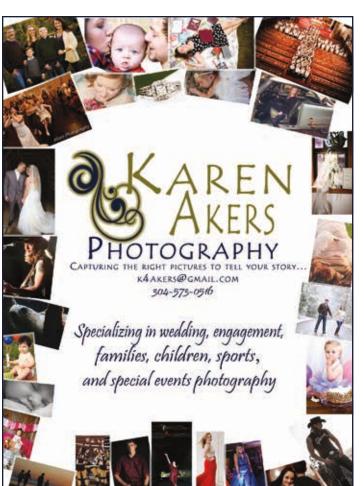


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# DAM SOCIAL

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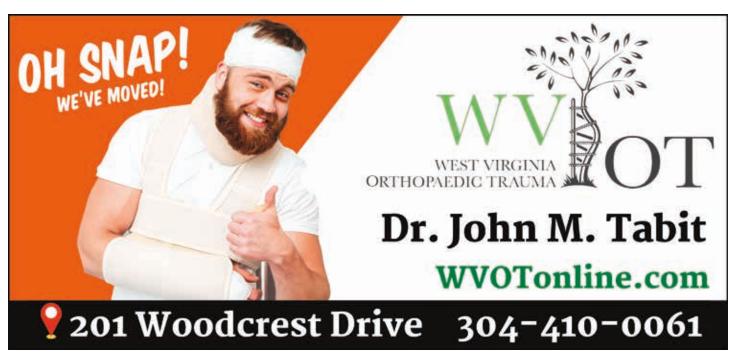
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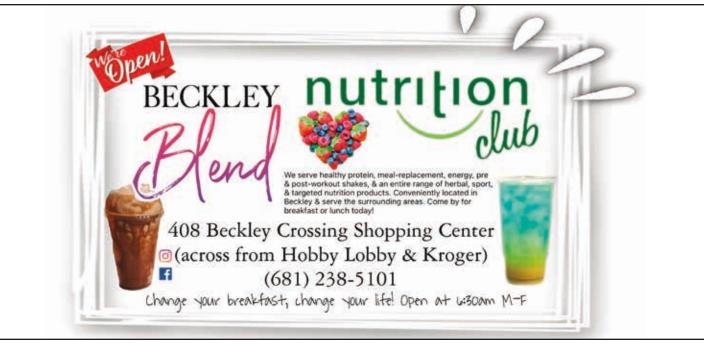


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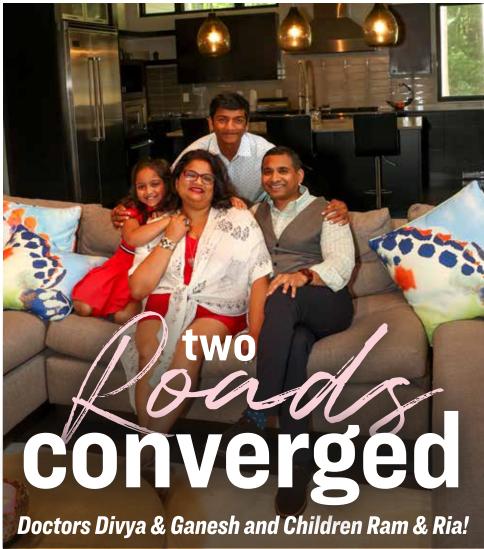












Ria, Divya, Ram and Ganesh!

When I first heard the story of Drs. Divya and Ganesh Rajan/ Asaithambi and their two children, Ram and Ria, I immediately conjured visions of perhaps Robert Frost's most famous and most quoted poem, "The Road Not Taken." Only in reverse! Divya and Ganesh's paths converged, not in a "yellow wood" as Frost pondered, but in medical school in Ganesh's native India, where they first met as young medical students, and "it has made all the difference," as only America's most revered poet laureate would wax. The two specialists have worked hard to keep their lives intertwined, which, because of their diverse medical training and expertise, could have taken them down very different paths.

"Upon graduation from medical school," Divya related, "we came to the states to do our residencies in internal medicine and searched for a hospital that would accept us both." After getting married in Pittsburgh, the couple did their joint residencies at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Paterson, NJ, and that was where Ram was born. Soon they had to make a difficult decision. Divya, who was raised in Cumberland, MD, the daughter of an esteemed psychiatrist, and Ganesh, who had never been out of his native India until Divya brought him to America, decided their schedules were so demanding that the best thing for their

firstborn would be to entrust her parents with the task (which they loved) of caring for Ram until they could finish their training.

Meanwhile, they still had to complete their specialties: Divya in nephrology and Ganesh in cardiology. Their good fortune continued because Saint Joseph's offered both programs, allowing them once again the convenience of remaining together in one place. Then the task of finding a place to raise their family that would allow them to apply their specialties in the same hospital came to the fore. Enter Beckley ARH and John Sinko.

"We came to West Virginia, fell in love with ARH, which just happened to have an opening for both of us, and when John showed us Glade Springs, we were sold," she recalled. In 2010, they moved into a home on Barnstaple just off the fairway of hole number five. Daughter Ria came along two years later, and in 2016, they moved to





The Farms and into their beautiful contemporary home situated between the Sinkos and the Salons. With beautiful views of the surrounding forest, a backyard pool and enough garage space to house Ganesh's treasured car collection, they could not be happier. And, to make things even better, her parents also moved to Glade in 2021 and are just a stone's throw away on Hickory Court should they require a babysitter or should Ram and Ria have a craving for some of their grandmother's delicious Indian cuisine.

Fifteen-year-old Ram attends Woodrow Wilson High School, where he was chosen president of the sophomore class and is heading up the Wetlands Project on the Woodrow campus, the fundraising for which has already topped \$40,000. Their goal is to raise \$100,000 for the project. These young student activists have already received government grants, as well as grants from ARH and the Raleigh County Board of Education. The process has already given Ram great experience in how government and nonprofits function, so much so that he envisions a possible career in politics. He served as a page in the state legislature last winter and anchored the Woodrow boys' tennis team as their one seed and led them to the state tournament. He is looking forward to the challenge of AP courses in the coming school year. The well-spoken athlete and school leader is also a musician, having studied piano for 10 years. Ram says, "I get my athleticism from my father, who played cricket, tennis and basketball in India."

Little sister Ria has followed in her brother's footsteps and attends St. Francis, where she will be in Ms. Susan's fifth-grade class this fall. Her favorite



subject is social studies, but she indicates she would like "to become a kidney specialist, just like my mom." The bubbly and articulate Ria has been taking piano for four years and attributes her musicality to her mother, who plays the violin. She is also a tennis player and loves to swim. When she works up an appetite, she goes for the hot dogs at Small Talk when she can't get her hands on any of Nana's chicken curry.



Currently, Divya serves as the chief of medical staff at Raleigh General Hospital, and Ganesh is chairman of medicine at RGH. It is obvious that their two apples didn't fall far from their trees. Both youngsters have a zest for life and have set some

lofty goals for their futures and are working hard to turn those dreams into reality, just as their parents did when their paths converged many years before.

German shorthair, Cora. She also loves Marvel and Disney movies.

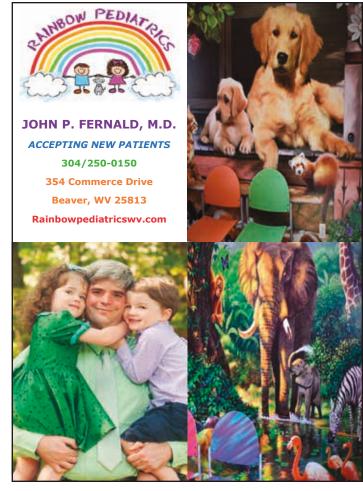

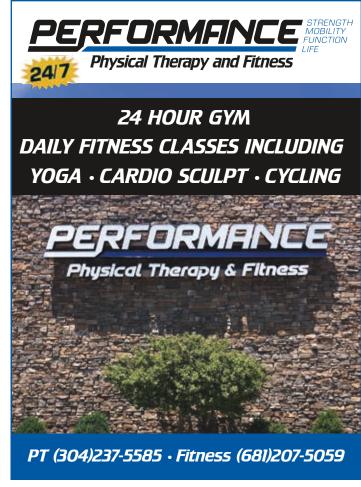


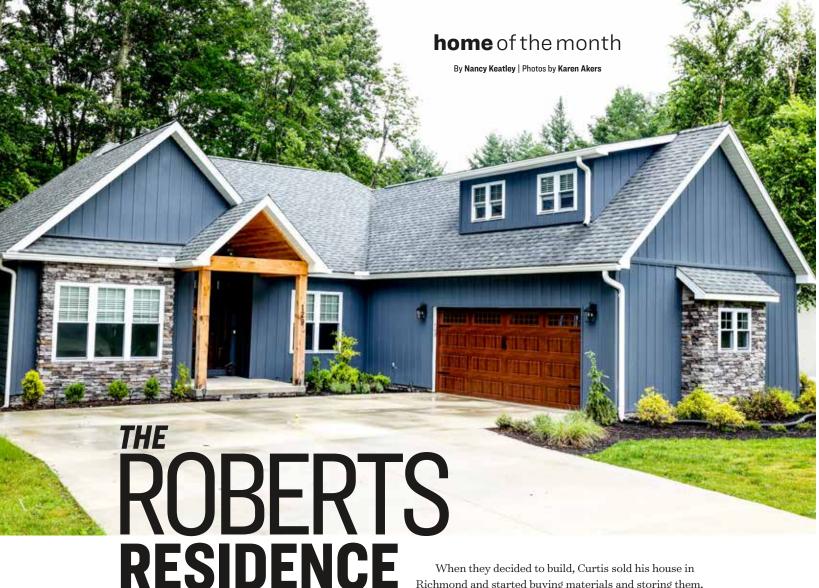

In the plan, the fireplace was in the back corner, which eliminated two windows looking onto the back porch and yard.

They relocated it to the middle of the wall, and Sara added bookshelves on each side. They also lowered the ceiling in the kitchen, giving a better look to the cabinets and

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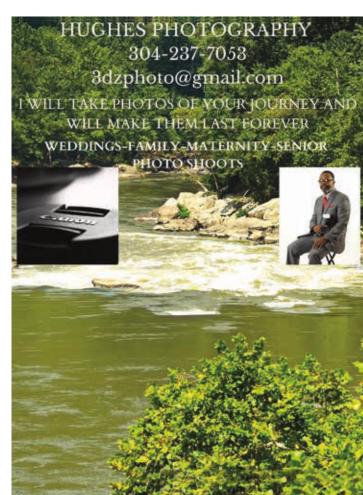






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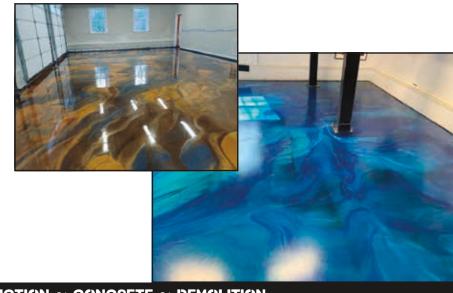
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Quiet, please, Biscuit at work!

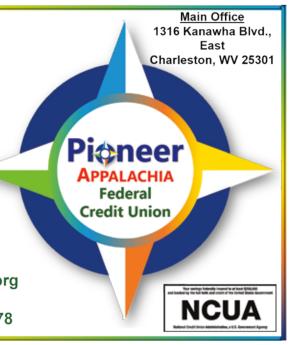


#### **Ingredients and Directions**

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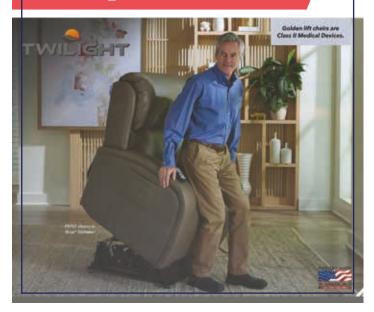
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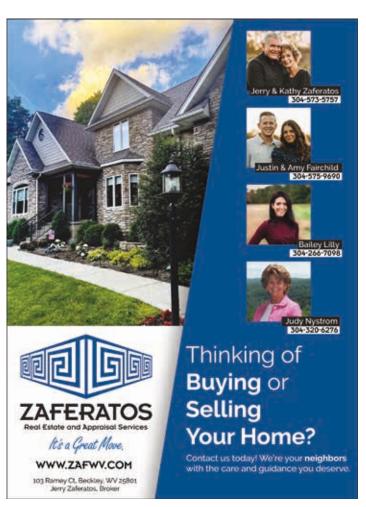

Empty Bowls is a program designed to help fight hunger in America that has grown into a country-wide movement since it began in 1990 in Michigan when a high school art teacher had her students craft bowls to be used in a fundraiser/soup dinner to feed the hungry. The idea initially was that after the event, participants got to keep their empty bowls as a reminder that many less fortunate only have enough to eat each day to fill the bowl once.

Locally the Empty Bowls program has been taken up by the Beckley Quota Club, working in conjunction with the Beckley Youth Museum and the Beckley Area Foundation. Initially, Willie Mae Skelton got the Beckley branch of the Quota Club involved after attending her grandson's fundraiser for a deaf community in North Carolina. Rebecca Beckett, a local artist and educator, had worked with an Empty Bowl event in Huntington, so

she headed up the early bowl making using the kiln at the youth museum. Leslie Baker, director of the youth museum, obtained a grant for supplies from the Beckley Area Foundation. Beckett got other area art teachers involved, and the mission to aid the hungry grew locally. Beckett has since passed the torch to Wyoming East Art Teacher Norma Acord-Combs. The city of Beckley, through the YM, has been very supportive.

Past QC President and Treasurer Beth Jarrell is one of many local volunteers who continued the work to keep



Southern West Virginia food pantries stocked. "It is truly a community project now. The host for the event for the past few years has been The Place on the campus of the United Methodist Temple. Members of Woodrow Wilson's National Honor Society and volunteers from Brian's Safe House help with setting up, serving patrons and cleaning up after the event," she says proudly.

The Quota Club has now added a silent option and a raffle as part of the fundraising. "Last year, we raised \$20,000, and every penny was dispersed to help feed our residents," Jarrell said. "Businesses and churches have hosted bowl making, while many businesses and local artisans have donated to the auction and raffle. Soup vendors include Tamarack, Pasquale's, The Dish, Black Knight and Daniels' Vineyards. Panera furnishes bread while other local restaurants provide desserts.

A date for the 2023 Empty Bowls event has not yet been determined, but Jarrell and her cohorts

at the Quota Club are already working toward making it the most successful one yet. Jarrell says the project and the Quota Club can always use more volunteers and more help. Anyone interested should just reach out to her, and she will assist them in making a difference in their community and in the lives of their neighbors.

### "SHOCKTOBER": **A SPOOKY MONTH FOR INVESTORS?**

Just when you thought hair-raising ghosts and creepy crawlies were the biggest scares this month...

elcome to October, one of the most feared months on the financial calendar. Why? Take a look back in history, for precedence:

- The Bank Panic of October 1907. This six-week financial panic led to multiple bank runs, widespread public distrust and heavy panic-selling at the exchange. Halted by a J.P. Morgan-led Wall Street conglomerate, the crisis led to the formation of the Federal Reserve System.
- · The Wall Street Crash of October **1929 (the Great Crash).** Described as a "bloodletting on an unprecedented scale," a combination of low wages, rising debt, a

fraught agricultural sector and unfettered market speculation led to billions of dollars lost and many bankruptcies ... and, eventually, the Great Depression.

· Stock market crash of October 1987 (Black Monday). Known as the first contemporary global financial crisis, this chain reaction of market calamity sent international stock exchanges plummeting over several hours. The Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) fell 23% on this unhappy day.

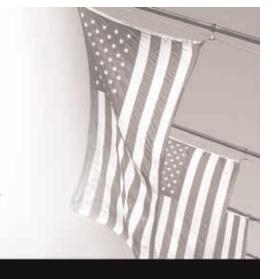
Experts point to several reasons for the so-called "October effect." In general, summer months tend to be

low volatility, leading stockholders to become relaxed and less attentive to signs of its slowing. When the inevitable happens — and it typically happens in September/October spooked investors make an exit all at once, upsetting the balance entirely. The following fall, the psychological impact of the previous year's fallout

To break the cycle, market experts advise keeping a clear head as the leaves start to turn. Relying on your investing knowledge, experience and technical skill - rather than emotion - will help you navigate whatever the financial future holds.

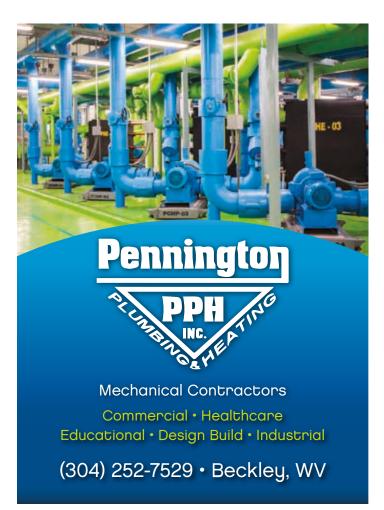
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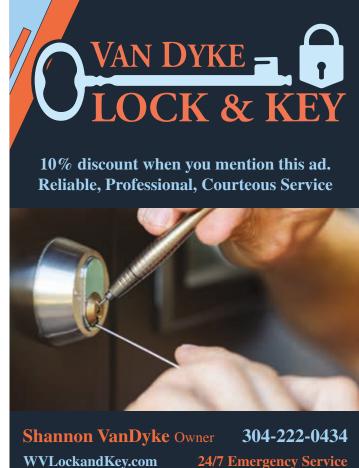
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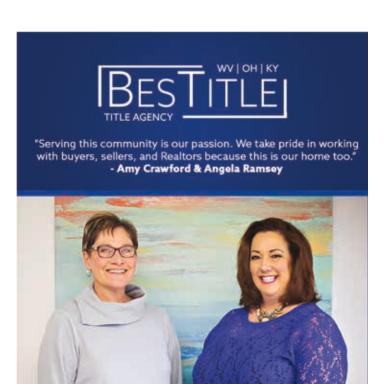
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many American adults may not be aware of how

much protein they do or should consume daily. The current recommended dietary allowance (RDA) for protein is 0.8 grams/kg of body weight — or about 7 grams for every 20 pounds of body weight. That's at least 55 grams for a 150-pound moderately active adult. And that's just the *minimum*!

So, exactly how much protein should we be eating every day? For adults, nutrition studies suggest an average of 20 grams of protein per meal. However, older adults may need more due to increased anabolic resistance and decreased muscle protein synthesis (our bodies' ability to build and maintain lean muscle). Athletes and bodybuilders should aim for 25-30 grams of protein per meal.

What is the most beneficial time of day to consume protein? Since muscle protein synthesis only lasts four or five hours, we should distribute our consumption throughout the day. A recent study in the Journal of Nutrition found that muscle protein synthesis was 25% higher when protein was evenly distributed across meals instead of focused on a protein-heavy evening meal, even when total protein intake was the same. Do you want to feel more satiety with all meals? Increase your protein!

Protein is the powerhouse responsible for maintaining muscles, organs, blood, skin and hair, as well as transporting oxygen, fats, vitamins and minerals in our bodies; we don't want to come up short on this crucial macronutrient!

#### 1. SWAP OUT YOUR CLOSET

Time to trade those strappy sandals and tank tops for cozy sweaters, scarves and boots! 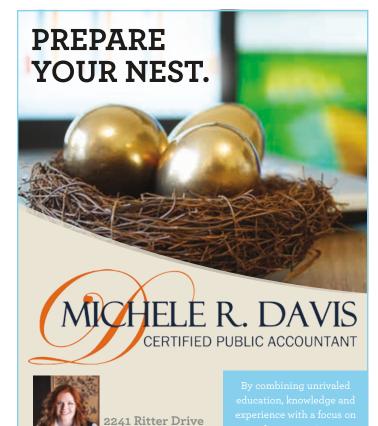

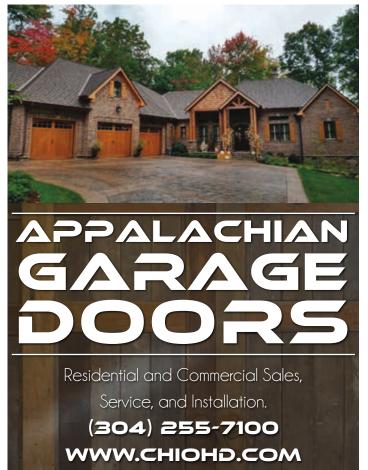
